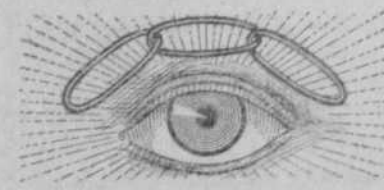

DULUTH MOB MURDERS THREE MEN SUSPECTED OF REVOLTING CRIME

(Continued From First Page.) the brother of the assaulted girl, stood high up on the pole and kicked repeatedly at the face and head of the dying wretch.

When the hanging was over, the crowd stood and, with the aid of a searchlight focused on the two men dangling in the air, viewed the results of its defiance of all law and order with calm satisfaction. The mob slowly dispersed and it was about 1 o'clock when the police were able to get close enough to the bodies to cut them down and turn them over to a local undertaker. Two were still hanging to the pole and one was lying on the ground, battered and bruised, where the mob had stamped and kicked the body fiendishly.

Headquarters a Wreck. The headquarters station is a wreck from basement to the third floor. The mob apparently was insane with desire to destroy and wreak vengeance. Windows, furniture, office records and even the battery room on the third floor were destroyed.

Some Typical Denunciations.

The Kiwanis Club. Duluth has been disgraced before the world, and every decent citizen has been made to hang his head in shame because of the horrible crime perpetrated by a mob of Duluth men. They have outraged civilization, humiliated and disgraced their own city, and made of themselves loathsome criminals, therefore be it

"Resolved, That the Kiwanis club of Duluth condemns the lawless mob that outraged our city the night of June 15, 1920, as disgraceful, barbaric and criminal, and denounces every individual who participated therein as unworthy of the law and civilization to which they now look and have looked for protection."

Presbyterian Minister.

Rev. George Brewer, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, made the following comment:

"I am appalled at the situation Duluth finds herself in today—humiliated among the law-abiding, order-loving cities of our land. No defense can be made for the work of this mob. Every brute in human form who criminally outrages a woman deserves the extreme penalty of the law, but never administered by a lawless mob. Every member of a mob that does violence to any human life is a murderer and, I hope, will be speedily brought to justice."

Rector of St. Paul's.

Dr. A. W. Ryan, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal church, spoke as follows:

"We are all humiliated by the disgraceful violence of the mob last night. We sympathize profoundly with the poor girl in the case, with her unfortunate escort and with her parents. But there is no excuse for the utter anarchism of such blind violence. No one can be sure the victims were the guilty ones, and so the deed must ever be murder, pure and simple. We feel that our police failed lamentably in their plain duty. It is not good policy for the guardians of the law to shoot in general, but here was plenty of warning; here was the dignity of the law to be upheld; here was opportunity to quell any unrestrained spirit which might break forth at any time and certainly has wide opening now to do so, since they need not fear any immediate consequences. Further, there would be no doubt but that justice would be meted out by our judges and prosecuting attorneys. We are singularly fortunate in having men who would do their whole duty as they see it. We trust that every good man and true will lift up his voice in bitter condemnation of such a disgraceful act as will advertise us as little better than savages all over our land. Duluth stands now shamed in the eyes of the world."

Catholic Priests Landed.

"All honor to the Roman Catholic priests and Hugh McClearn, who tried boldly to face and overcome the mob."

"It is high time for our press, our schools and churches to work with more effectiveness for law and decency and justice."

"We brought the Negroes to this country, we have shamefully neglected their education and religious training, there are a host of most respectable men and women among them. How little does such an act as this tend to smooth out racial antagonism and race friction."
