ASSOCIATION OFFICERS COVER ENTIRE COUNTRY

An Intelligent, Well-Directed Force of a Quarter of a Million Will country. Be an Irresistible Power for Justice-Definite Program Outlined for 1921, Which Includes Anti-Lynching Legislation by Congress, Enfranchisement, Abolition of Jim-Crow Cars and raised enough of the money needed Suppression of Activities of Ku Klux Klan.

NEW YORK, N. Y., March 10.—The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, 70 Fifth avenue, New York, announces the opening of its drive for a quarter of a million members, the greatest massing of colored people and their white friends against discrimination ever seen in the United States.

The heads of the association and the executive officers are distributed among the various states and sections and the drive is beginning simultaneously everywhere with local mass

In the South, Dr. W. E. B. DuBois, editor of the Crisis magazine, and William Pickens, former dean of Morgan College and now field secretary of the association, are getting the drive under way.
