SAYS DAUGERTY

(Special to Monitor)

(By Walter J. Singleton) WASHINGTO, D. C., Dec. 22.-The annual report of Attorney General Daugherty has just been published, and contains some statements that will excite wide comment. It is frankly patient, but finally submitted when admitted, in this report, that peonage still exists, to some extent in the outhern states. IN OTHER WORDS

The report reads in part as fol-

"The victims are almost always extremely poor, ignorant and friendless,' said Daugherty. "Many times it apnears that county officers conspire with the employers to force these unfortunates into bondage, which is his body riddled with bullets. He worse than outright slavery."
