Buenos Aires .- Doctor Hartmann, director of the La Plata observatory, says that the orbit of the little planet he discovered on November 4 lies between the orbits of the planets Jupiter is covered in five years and seven months.

As the plane of the orbit is very inclined in regard to the earth's equator, the new planet can approach the poles closer than most of the other planets and may be observed late this year unposition.

The diameter of the globe is estimated at about 151/2 miles, as its brilliancy, taken at the last observation, appeared to be of the fifteenth magnitude.


