RECOGNIZED BY ALL

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 24 .- (Associated Negro Press.)-Attention is directed to the part played by colored newspaper in the recent election. Only a limited number of the papers urged their readers to "Vote the Straight Republican Titcket".

The majority of them gave preserence to republican news, while a number gave liberal space to news of local demcratic candidates, and accepted advertisements from both parties, as the dally papers do.

In a few instances, newspapers normally republican, openly opposed certain republican candidates.

Editorially the newspapers gave carefully discriminating suggestions; strong republican leaning with a tempting flavor of independence and disappointment. Thousands of voters throughout the country were guided in their opinions by the information obtained in the newspapers of their group.

The newspapers were quoted both in editorials and news articles by stump speakers. The great influence of colored newspapers is recognized by all political parties, leaders, candidates and the people themselves.




