Fierce Wars Over Cinnamon.

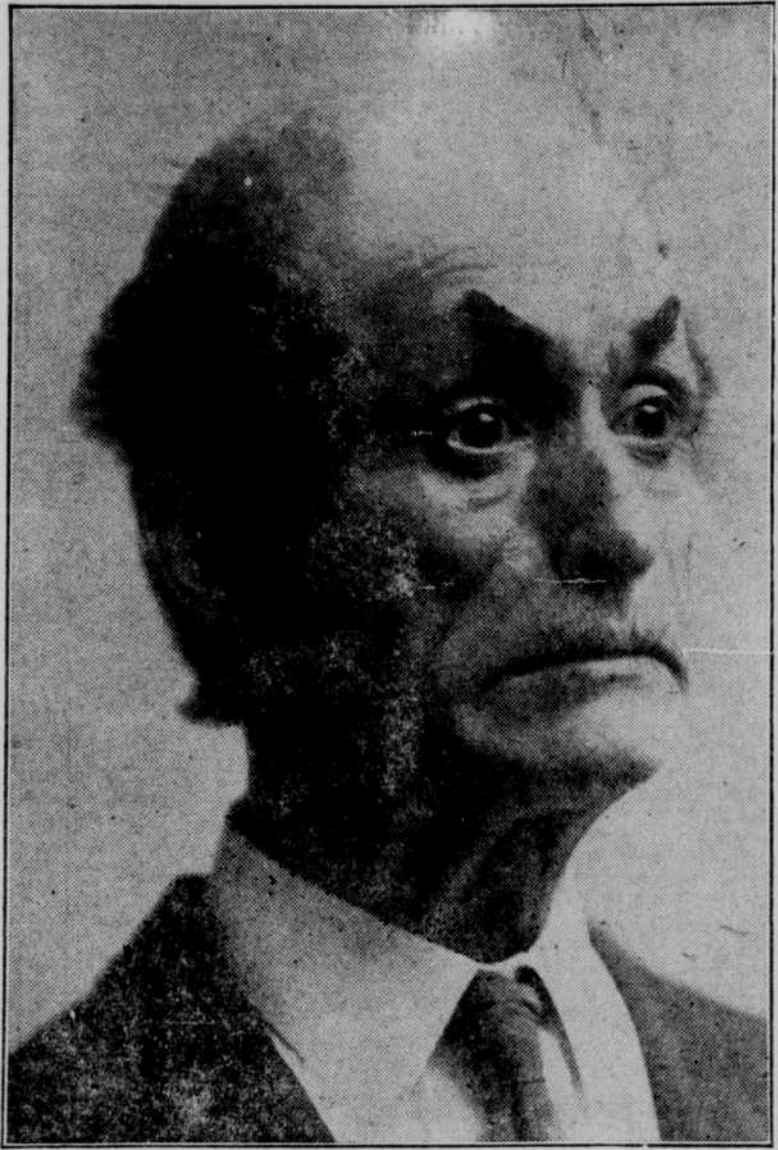
