FEW ARE COLLEGE TRAINED.

Washington, D. C., July 27 .- The demand for colored ministers of the WOMEN LEAD IN OPPOSITION Gospel in the United States is 1,500 a year, according to statistics col- Federation of Colored Women's Clubs lected today by Howard University under the supervision of the Department of the Interior.

Last year less than 100 colored men graduated from any kind of training school in the country for preachers and of this number less han 10 were colloge graduates. The average training of the other 90 for

There are about 50,000 colored churches of all denominations in the Women's Club, groups of women from U. S. Shortage of preachers is illustrated by the fact that there is one white minister to every 389 white people, most of the latter being graduated from theological institutions.

Howard University is one of the few a school of religion for colored people, the number of graduates averaging between 5 and 10 a year. At the present time this school of religion receives no appropriations from the Government.
