### ARTICLE XIV, CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

Citizenship Rights Net to Be Abridged

1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

The opposition to him by Southern senators was solely on the ground of color-although in color he is as white as some of the senators who opposed him and, who if the truth were known, may have as much Negro blood as he. His rejection by the Senate, each time by a close vote, was out of deference to the "senatorial courtesy" demanded by the Senators of Louisiana, who protested that he was "personally objectionable" to them. President Coolidge is to be commended for ignoring the objection and twice renominating him, refusing. like Roosevelt in the case of Dr. Crum, to admit color as a valid ground of objection to a federal apent. The closeness of the vote, 39 to 38, shows that there is still a vast deal of educational work along the line of Americanization to be done even in the United States Senate.

# Nebraska Civil Rights Bill

Chapter Thirteen of the Revised Statutes of Nebraska, Civil Rights.

Sec. 1. Civil rights of persons. All persons within this state shall be entitled to a full and equal enjoyment of the accommodations, advantages, facilities and privileges of inns, restaurants, public conveyances, barber shops, theatres and other places of amusement; subject only to the conditions and limitations established by law and applicable alike to every

Sec. 2. Penalty for Violation of Preceding Section. Any person who shall violate the foregoing section by denying to any person, except for reasons of law applicable to all persons, the full enjoyment of any of the accommodations, advantages, facilities, or privileges enumerated in the foregoing section, or by aiding or inciting such denials, shall for each effense be guilty of a misdemeanor, and be fined in any sum not less than twenty-five dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars, and pay the costs of the prosecution.

"The original act was held valid as to citisens; barber shops can not inate against persons on account of color. Messenger vs State, 25 Nebr. page 677. N. W. 628."

"A restaurant keeper who refuses to serve a colored person with refreshments in a certain part of his restaurant, for no other reach than that he is colored, is civilly liable, though he offers to serve him by setting a table in amore private part of the house.
