Policemen Have Been Appointed to Guard Brown's Home and District Attorney to Start Investigation

New York, July 31.-A special grand jury, called by District Attorney Albert C. Fach of Richmond county, to question fifteen whites subpoenaed on charges of damaging the property of Samuel Brown, a colored postal employee, of 67 Fairview avenue, Castleton Hill, West New Brighton, L. I., and attempting to frighten him and his family from their home, adjourned Tuesday without taking any action. Thursday was set as the date for the resumption of the case.

"A Matter of Principle" Brown, who has become the victim of a residential segregation design, following his refusal to sell his property in the exclusive Castleton Hill district to whites for less than \$12,000. before the court adjourned declared: "It is now a matter of principle with me; I am going to fight it out

to the end." Attack Home

Several attacks have been made on Brown's home, the last one occuring at 3:30 o'clock last Friday morning. A number of white men hurled bricks through windows of the house, uprooted trees and destroyed flowers. trict attorney, who called the special

White neighbors of Brown have admitted that they tried to induce him to move out of that neighborhood.
