At the coming State Fair, the first week in September, there will be a new classification for County Collective Exhibits. The state has been divided into three districts, the Eastern being the counties lying east of the west line of Knox, Pierce, Madison, Colfax, Butler, Seward, Saline and Jefferson counties. The Central being the counties lying west of said line and east of the west line of Boyd, Holt, Garfield, Coster, Dawson, Frontier and Red Willow counties and the Western being all the counties lying west of said line. Twenty-five hundred dollars is set apart for premiums. All exhibits to participate in the premium money must score sixty per cent of the highest score in their particular district, by Ream Score Card. All exhibits scoring above sixty per cent will participate equally in \$1410.00 (being 60 per cent of \$2350 00), and in \$940.00 pro rata, according to the number of points above the minimum. In addition to above, \$50.00 will be awarded to each exhibit scoring the highest in its district. Lancaster county is allowed to exhibit under a handicap of 100 points. Board of county commissioners met pursuant to adjournment, members present, Thomas C Baird, chairman; Ed Morgan and John Sierz and W L Ross, county clerk.

It appearing to the board that the petition of Maurice O'Connor for liquor license had been duly filed according to law and the proper notice had been given as required by law and that bond as required by law had been filed and approved by the board, on motion of board license to sell malt, spirituous and vinous liquors at Naocora, Nebraska was granted and allowed for a period of twelve months, ending May 1, 1908, and the county clerk was ordered to issue said license on payment of \$500 revenue to the county treasurer. Said license was granted on express condition that said Maurice O'Connor should conduct saloon and sale of liquor in all manner as provided by Chapter XXXII entitled Liquors, Compiled Statutes of Nebraska, and on violation of any of the provisions of said act license shall be void. Commissioners reserve right to revoke license for violation of law or violation of order and regulation of the board of commissioners now in force or that may hereafter be provided.

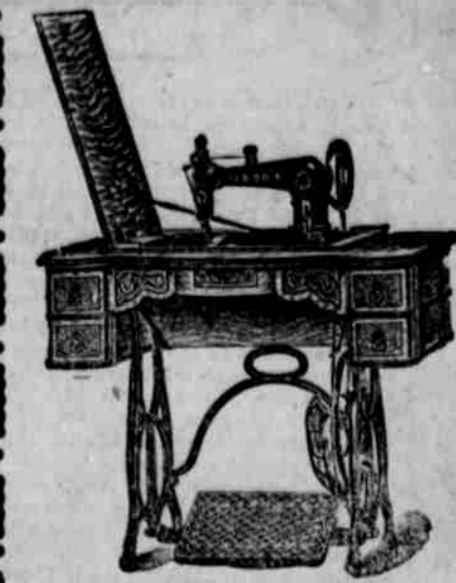
