Under these orders no cattle or sheep can be permitted to pass over the Combination Bridge from the state of Nebraska unless the driver of such cattle or sheep has a permit from a United States inspector. Permits can be secured by applying to the United States inspector at the Exchange Building at the Sioux City stock yards in person or by letter or telephone, such permits are good for ten days after they are issued.

The gasoline street car which was built at Harvey, Ill, for the Foye line, arrived in Sioux City last Sunday, and the first of the week was unloaded from the flat car on which it was shipped, and was limbered up preparatory to making its initial trip over the line.
