Lutheran Conference

The forty-first semi-annual convention of the North Platte conference of the Lutheran Synod of Nebr, was held at Dakota City last Tuesday and Wednesday.

The opening session was held on Tuesday evening. Rev W C Eckhart offered the invocation, the choir rendered an anthem and Rev W S Oberholzer spoke words of greeting. Rev Lewis of South Omaha being absent on account of sickness, Rev L J Powell, of West Point, responded to the welcome. Miss Perle E Stinson then rendered a beautiful solo after which Rev A E Deitz, of Ponca, made a very interesting and instructive address concerning the work of the Lutheran church on the Pacific coast.

Wednesday morning at 8:30 conference was opened with devotional services led by Rev J L Hammond, of Homer. The conference being without a president, Rev Oberholzer was appointed pro-tem and Rev L J Powell, secretary and treasurer. Conference was then addressed in a very instructive way by L Groh, D D, of Omaha, who spoke of his experience in visiting the various charges of the Nebraska Synod of which he is president.

Rev Ringer, of Wayne, then spoke in a comprehensive manner as to the purpose of our conference. Following this a well prepared paper was read by Rev L J Powell, of West Point, on how to foster the young people's societies.

Rev Hummes, of Omaha, was not present to speak on his subject of "Practical results to be derived from a series of sermons." A number of the ministers present made remarks on this topic.

A short business session was then held after which conference adjourned to the parsonage for dinner. By the kindness of the ladies of the church all guests were served with refreshments at noon and evening in the parsonage dining room. This arrangement gave opportunity for a very pleasant time in a social way.

At the opening of the session in the afternoon Rev Eckhart read an excellent paper on "The Sabbath, Why keep it? How keep it?" Every Sabbath desecrator in this community should have been present to hear this topic. After this a paper was read by the secretary, on "The Modern Temperance Movement," that had been prepared and sent by Rev M L Melick, of Omaha, who could not be present.

We then listened to a most instructive and encouraging report of the recent General Convention of the W H & F M society by Miss Elizabeth S Haase, who had just returned from that convention held at Dixon, Ill.

Rev Kistler of Benson, who was to speak about the "Missionary Growth and Outlook of the Church" in general, was absent on account of sickness. Instead Dr Groh gave a fine history of the rapid growth of the Lutheran church in this country in the period over which his ministry has extended.

At the business session following, Rev Oberholzer was elected president and Rev L J Powell, of West Point, secretary and treasurer for the next year.

At the evening session Dr Groh preached an instructive sermon on "Faith." After which resolutions of thanks were extended to the congregation and choir for entertainment and singing and the generous hospitality shown to all who were present at this conference. All departed for their homes with expression of praise for the pleasant season spent in our midst.
