While the recount held in Judge Stinson's court last January showed that in Summit precinct alone there was a difference of eleven votes in the count of the election board and that of the recount, in favor of Berry, the court held that between the two dates there was a possible chance that the ballots might have been tampered with, and consequently would not recognize them as evidence in the case, and as that was the only tangible evidence to be had there was nothing else to do. Mr Berry will appeal the case to the supreme court.

Mert Davis, who was held on a charge of highway robbery on a complaint filed by Amelia O'Neill of South Sioux City, was brought before the court Saturday and plead guilty. He was sentenced to 5 years in the penitentiary, and was taken there Monday by Deputy Sheriff Bierman to begin his sentence.
