

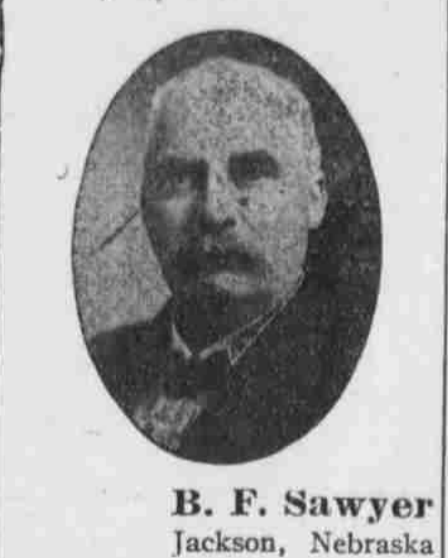

The appointments were all made from the class of applicants that took the civil service examination before Postmaster John H Ream of this place on February 5th, with the exception of W J Manning. Following are the appointments and the precincts in which they will work: Covington precinct, including South Sioux City, and lands recently ceded Nebraska by South Dakota and adjoining said precinct, Burt Kroesen, of South Sioux City; Dakota precinct, including Dakota City, John L Phillips of South Sioux City; Emerson precinct, including that part of Emerson village in Dakota county, Hubbard precinct, including Hubbard village, and Omaha precinct, including Homer village, George B Rockwell of Hubbard; Pigeon Creek and Summit precincts, Mrs Anna Bonickson of Waterbury; St John's precinct, including Jackson Village, W J Manning of South Sioux City. The work of taking the census will begin on April 15th. Already considerable literature has been mailed to the farmers to assist in getting a correct farm census, and it is earnestly requested that all the assistance possible be rendered the enumerators in their work in order to get as complete a census as possible.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs A J Kramer. In the address of welcome the formation of the club, its object and plan of work was explained. A cordial invitation was extended to all to become members. The constitution of the club was read by the secretary.

The roll call responses, a humorous saying, was announced, "Broommaking" by Mrs S A Stinson, "System in Housecleaning" by Mrs George Bates, and "Shrubs Suited to this Locality" by Mrs D C Stinson, were discussed by the ladies and some interesting points brought out. August Gerlach Bound Over to the District Court

August Gerlach, who was arrested and lodged in the county jail at this place recently for the killing of Joseph Lee at Emerson, Neb, January 13th, was given a preliminary hearing before County Judge Heffernan last Friday and the case against him was dismissed. County Attorney McAllister immediately filed another complaint against Gerlach and he was re-arrested and placed in jail again. He was given a hearing on Monday on practically the same charge and with the same evidence and was held to the district court without bond.

The defense put up the plea of self-defense, and Glen Smith, the only eye-witness to the shooting, testified that Lee was in the act of drawing a revolver when Gerlach fired first.

Assessors Fix Personal Values

County Assessor Reininger and the precinct assessors met at Dakota City Saturday. Those in attendance at the meeting were: H E Chaffin, chairman; A Ira Davis, Emerson; Ern Harris, Omaha; H W Meeker, Covington; Peter Carmoy, St John's; M Beacom, Sioux Falls; W L Ross, Dakota City.

The land valuations will be the same as last year, real estate values being fixed only every four years.

Antiques, agricultural tools, implements and machinery, diamonds and other valuable stones, office fixtures, furniture and equipment, musical instruments and plated ware, will be assessed at full value.

Bonds, steam engines, including boilers, and building, proof, water, type writing machines, adding machines, book accounts, cash registers, billiard and other similar tables, pianos, organs and other musical instruments, household effects, furniture and library, mechanical tools, law and medical books, surgical instruments, gold, silver and plated ware, will be assessed at full value.

Horses and mules will be assessed as follows: The assessor to use judgment in listing the same: Under 1 year, \$60; over 1 and under 2, \$100; over 2 and under 3, \$125; over 3 and under 4, \$150; Cattle: Under 1 year, \$10; over 1 year and under 2, \$15; over 2 years and under 3, \$20; over 3 years, \$25. Fat cattle will go on the list at \$4.50 per 100; sheep and goats, at \$3 per head; hogs of all ages, \$8 per 100; stands of bees, \$2; poultry, 25 cents a head.

Wheat, 90 cents; corn, 40 cents; oats, 30 cents; barley, 40 cents; potatoes, 40 cents; flax seed, 40 cents; grass, alfalfa and clover seed, \$10. Hay and alfalfa will go in at \$4 per ton.

A face valuation will be placed on the following classes: Notes, firearms, steamboats, rowboats and other water craft.

Telephones will be assessed at the amount invested, while goods, merchandise and manufactured articles will be listed at 75 per cent of invoice price.

Dogs of any size, breed, color or sex will be assessed at \$5 each.
