

COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES

Our deputy state superintendent, Frank S. Pordan, will give an address at the Lincoln school house Saturday evening, July 16th, at 8:30 o'clock, explaining the consolidation of rural school districts for the purpose of organizing a rural high school. All patrons of school districts numbers 2, 4, 12, 13, and 21, should make it a point to be present this week.

Ninety-nine eighth grade pupils took the examination this spring and forty-four of them received diplomas.

All teachers who are behind in their examinations should avail themselves of the opportunity of taking the special examination for life certificates which will be offered on Wednesday, July 27, and Thursday, July 28. No examination in life subjects will be given this week.

Twenty-six rural pupils applied for high school admission certificates this year. The number in each district is as follows: No. 1 (Meridian) eight, No. 17 (Shull) seven, No. 18 (Weigle) three, No. 18 (Hileman) three, No. 12 (Parker) one, No. 28 (Plum Grove) one, No. 20 (Hale) one, No. 32 (Hume) two.

State Boundary Line Questioned A suit that promises to attract the attention and consideration of the state legislatures of both Iowa and Nebraska was started today by several land owners near Homer, Neb, through their attorneys, A Van Wagenen and J A Van Wagenen. The dispute is over a tract of about 1,771 acres of land near Homer, Neb, and was brought up by the wanderings of the Missouri river.

Litigants on the Iowa side of the river claim that by accretion they gained possession of the land many years ago and that a recent move of the stream which cut them off from the land, did not take it from their possession. The Nebraskans claim the river did not make the sudden jump claimed by the Iowans, but moved over to the Iowa side slowly, and gave the property back into their possession by accretion.

Litigation over this land is of long standing. Many years ago Iowans had their title to a large tract of the land quieted. Since then portions of the property have changed hands several times. Recently Leary P Hall, wishing to sell some of his land, tried to make a deal with Eugene Parley, of Omaha, Neb, but Parley desired a clearer title than Hall could give him, and this started litigation again. Hall had his title to the land established in the district court in Woodbury county. But the Van Wagenens will make a move by which they hope to have the action of the district court here put at naught and get all of the land in dispute for the Nebraskans. Neither appeared in the district court to contest the claim of Hall to the land, but on the other hand, ignoring the court's action, they will bring a suit in the Nebraska court asking that the title of the Nebraska land owners be quieted. The suit will be filed at Dakota City Neb today.

The burden is on the attorney to prove that the river did not make the jump the Iowans claim it did, and that the land belongs to those on the other side of the stream by accretion. A quick jump of the stream does not change the ownership of land, but if the river changes its course slowly, someone is bound to lose land and someone else bound to gain it. The land that was lost by the Nebraskans when the river slowly changed its course years ago was extremely valuable, and the farmers suffered a big loss.

As a direct outcome of the case, should the Van Wagenens win, it will be up to Iowa and Nebraska to decide where the boundary line of the two states lies. The question will be whether it changes with the river or remains in the original bed of the stream, in spite of the wanderings of the Missouri. It will be necessary to determine this to tell which of the courts, the Iowa or Nebraska, had jurisdiction in the matter of quieting title. This matter will be for the states themselves to decide.

Nebraska has a conditional reciprocal law, by which it agrees to let the Missouri river always be the boundary line, providing the adjoining state does the same thing. Iowa has no such law. It is thought as a result of the land litigation the two states will get together and make some kind of a provision for determining the state boundary.

Joe N. Leedom Resigns as Deputy Sheriff. Joe M Leedom, who has served in the capacity of deputy sheriff under Sheriff J P Rockwell since the first of April, on Tuesday tendered his resignation to his chief, to take effect at once. Following is a copy of the resignation: Dakota City, Neb., July 12, 1910. Hon. J. P. Rockwell, Sheriff, Dakota County, Neb. Dear Sir:—Grateful for the position of deputy to which you appointed me on the 1st of April, I feel that I can no longer serve as such deputy sheriff. The salary is small, and I am unable to maintain my family, and my obligations to my family are paramount with me. I must therefore leave to you my resignation, which I now do, to take effect at once. Thanking you for expression of confidence, I am, respectfully yours, JOE M. LEEDOM.

Joe has demonstrated his ability as a rustler since taking the deputyship, and has always been "Johnny on the spot" when there was anything to do. He is in a position to make considerable more money in his private business, and has already returned to his home at Hubbard and will immediately fit up his steam thrashing outfit and put it in readiness for the summer and fall thrashing.

Sheriff Rockwell has named no one as deputy yet, and may dispense with one for the time being and do the work himself, with the assistance of Marshal Jas Fueston.
