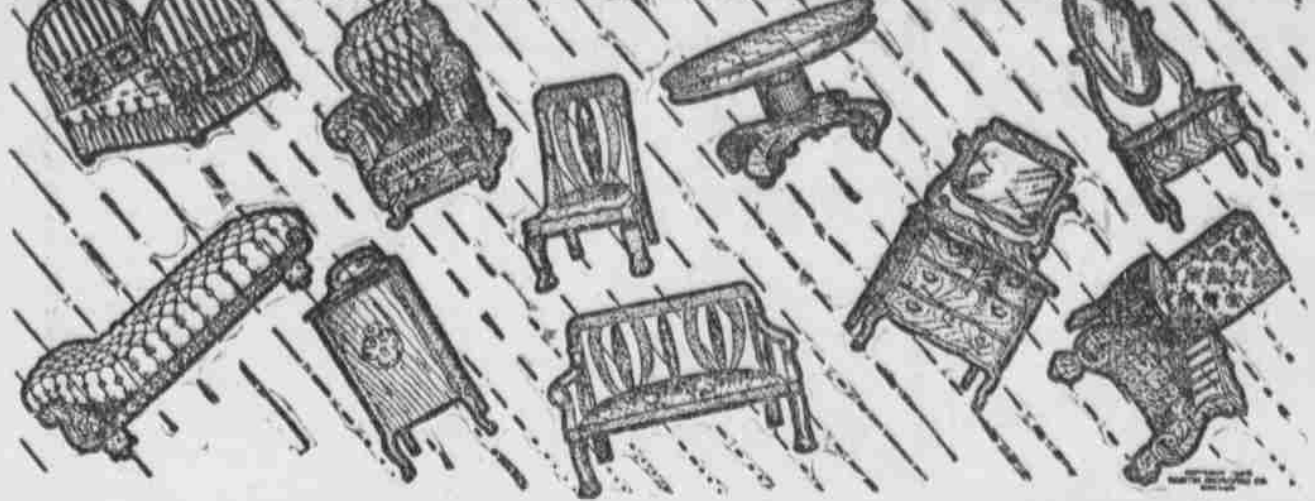

State Fair Items.

The entries for races of the State Fair, Sept 5th to 9th, will close next Monday, August 15th, and are as follows: Trotting 2:25, 2:30, 2:15 and 2:10; and pacing 2:20, 2:17, 2:12, 2:09 and 2:04. Each being for a purse of \$600 with a five per cent entry. At the same time closes the Nebraska derby of 1-1/8 miles which will be run on Tuesday of the fair, and the ten mile relay race, two miles each changing mounts at the end of each half mile. These together with the six early closing races, four of which are for \$1,000 each and nine running races, constitute the best list of races ever offered on a Nebraska course, and taken with Wright Bros Aeroplanes to make flights each day of the fair, together with other usual features, should furnish a very attractive program for fair visitors.

Another Old Pioneer Crosses the Dark River.

One by one the pioneers of Dakota county are crossing the dark river of death, and the ranks of the sturdy veterans who paved the way for civilization and the building up of the government and social condition unsurpassed in the west, are gradually thin-

ning until a few more years none of the vanguard will be left.

In the death of Christ Waddell, of South Sioux City on August 17th, 1910, Dakota county loses an honest, upright and substantial citizen, and his family a kind and tender father.

The following obituary is taken from the South Sioux City Record.



CHRIST WADDELL.

At his home in this city Wednesday evening the angel of death carried the soul of Christ Waddell into the great beyond. Mr Waddell had been in poor health for several years. He was born in Knox County, Ohio, July 3, 1836 and was 74 years 1 month and 14 days old. He was married January 13, 1860, to Miss Mary Davis at Springfield, Mahaska County, Iowa, and was preceded in death by his wife two years ago. Mr Waddell had been a citizen of Dakota County since 1868 and was an honest and upright man among his neighbors and a kind and loving husband and father. There remains to mourn his loss a sister, Sarah Watta, of Barnes City, Iowa, five children, Albert O Allen; Oscar of Naches, Washington; Mrs Emma Harden, Charles and Ira of this city. There are also 20 grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

The funeral will be held from the Methodist Church Saturday at 10 o'clock. Rev J H Hard a former pastor and Rev J L Phillips will conduct the services. Interment will be made at the Taylor cemetery near Homer.

Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners.

Dakota City, Neb, Aug, 20, 1910. The Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment, Present—Nelson Feauto, Chairman, Ed Morgan, Thos Long, and W L Ross, Clerk.

On motion it was ordered that the County Treasurer accept the principal of all taxes against lots in the several villages of the County where such tax payments for such tax up to and including the year 1905. This order is not intended to apply to lots heretofore sold for taxes and unredeemed from year 1906 inclusive. All taxes, principal and interest must be paid in full on such lots.

The board selected a jury list of 60 names for the fall term of Court.

Whereas on the 17th day of August 1904, judgments were rendered in the United States Court against School District No. 11, of Dakota County, Nebraska in favor of Edwards H Chapman and J Le Roy Buck as administrators of William Boswick, deceased, due on one principal bond and interest to Feb 1, 1911, the sum of \$3074.44:

And whereas in another action Edward D Shephard vs School Dist. No 11, Dakota County, Nebraska, a judgment was rendered against said district, which is due Feb 1, 1911 \$4857.88, costs \$280.16, and whereas the assessed value of taxable property in said District for year 1910 is but \$310,134.00, requiring a levy of 27 mills to liquidate and pay off said judgment, and whereas if such is levied in a single levy in addition to the other levies and taxes to be raised for the present year on said District it will be so oppressive on the taxpayers and taxable property in said District as to make it desirable and proper not to collect all of said sum this year—it is therefore ordered that but 9 mills be levied this year on the judgment of Edward D Shephard and 5 mills to apply on the J Le Roy Buck Judgment, or a total of 14 mills to be levied against all taxable property of School District No 11, Dakota County, Nebraska.

Board adjourned to September 11, 1910.
