Witnesses Coronation.

Extracts from a letter written by Miss Perle Stinson while in London coronation week.

London, June 25, 1911.

Dear Folks at Home:—

The coronation of King George V is over and we enjoyed it so much. Saw the parade both days and the second day saw it twice. The King and Queen were lovely to us. Of course they knew we were coming, so they had the city decorated and they themselves took part in the parade, and afterwards came out on the balcony and made their bow to several thousands besides us.

London is an immense place and I like it, but our stay here is far too short. You see two days were taken up seeing the swells and I saw them. A Scotchman sat next to me and told me who they were as they passed. Churchill was hissed by lots of people and by even the children.

The first day tickets sold for \$50 and up and the second day for \$15 and up, but I tell you it was worth seeing; such jewels and beautiful robes, horses, chariots, etc, the finest of everything in the land. I can't write about it all as time is so limited, but will do so later.

Was sick again coming from Calais to Dover, and as we leave in the morning for Cork, expect I will be sick again, soon after I get on the water, but I soon get well as soon as we get on land.

Got your letter here and one from Bess, and one from Miss Anderson. Had my fortune told last night and she said my best talent ran along the line of writing and I should cultivate it, so I am commencing, don't you see some improvement already? After I get to Ireland and kiss the Blarney stone I think surely words will come more fluently.
