Dakota City to Have Electric Light

An electric light and power plant is now an assured thing for Dakota City. A local company has been formed for the purpose of installing an electric light and power plant of sufficient capacity to furnish light for every house in town, and power for all purposes where electricity can be used. The promoters of the company are Henry Kromwiele, Frank H Forrest and Herbert D Wood, president, secretary and treasurer, respectively, of the new company, which will be known as the Dakota City Light and Power Com- pany. A building will be erected im- mediately, in the rear of Mr Wood's carpenter shop, in which to install the engine and dynamo. There have been enough already who have signified their willingness to take lights to war- rant the installing of the plant, and when once it is running it will without doubt be taxed to the limit. The vil- lage board at a meeting Tuesday evening assured the company that there would be no difficulty in their obtain- ing a franchise. An order was placed Wednesday for the necessary machin- ery and the work of installing the plant will be rushed as fast as possible.
