In the senate proceedings in the Omaha Bee of last Saturday the following mention is made of Senator Shumway's bill regulating Indian marriages:

"Shumway of Dixon introduced a bill by request of a council of the Winnebago Indians, asking that the customs heretofore in vogue among the Indians who are now residing in the state relative to marriages to be done away with and that these Indians be required in the future to marry according to the laws of the state. In speaking of the bill Senator Shumway said that he attended the meeting in which the resolution was passed asking that a bill be introduced covering the matter and that it was one of the most impressive meetings he had ever attended.

"They seem to understand fully," said the senator, "the situation they are in and they desire to have the past customs entirely wiped away and wish to start new and according to the law of the state."

"Indians who possess more than one wife will be required to take as his legal wife the woman he is living with at the present time and the marriage will be legalized. In the future they expect to be punished should they break any of the marriage laws. On or before the first day of April, 1913, county judges shall keep a record of all Indians residing in their county, with the name of the wife which the law recognizes and in case of violation of this act the violator shall be subject to the same punishment as a white man."

trip in Sioux City Saturday afternoon with her fiancé. Until Thursday morning the illness of Miss Norton was not considered serious. She had walked about the premises Wednesday afternoon. The attack, thought to be tonsillitis, was diagnosed as diphtheria, and quarantine was established. Anti-toxin was administered to Miss Norton. Death occurred early in the afternoon. Miss Norton was born at Waterloo, Ia, and came to Sioux City when 4 years old. She was 27 years old at the time of her death. During the last seven years she taught in the public schools and was teacher of a girl's class at the First Congregational Sunday school. Miss Norton's mother died six years ago, and since that time she has lived with her father, H M Norton, and her brother, Clarence Norton, on West Eighteenth street. A sister, Mrs J B Spayde, lives at 1801 Ross street. Miss Norton belonged to the Bay View club and the Eastern Star lodge. She was a member of the First Congregational church. The funeral will be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Westcott chapel. Rev Wallace M Short will conduct the services. Interment will be in the Logan Park cemetery. Resolutions of condolence directed to the family of Miss Norton were adopted at a meeting of the principals of the public schools in a meeting in the old council chamber of the city hall.

In 1878 Mr and Mrs Hensler moved to Dakota county, where they lived during thirty-two years. Recently Mr Hensler quit active farming and moved to Waterbury.

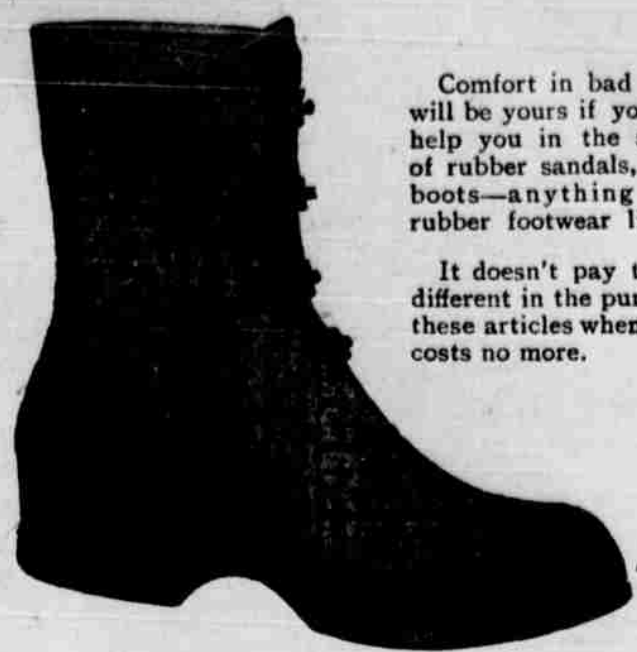

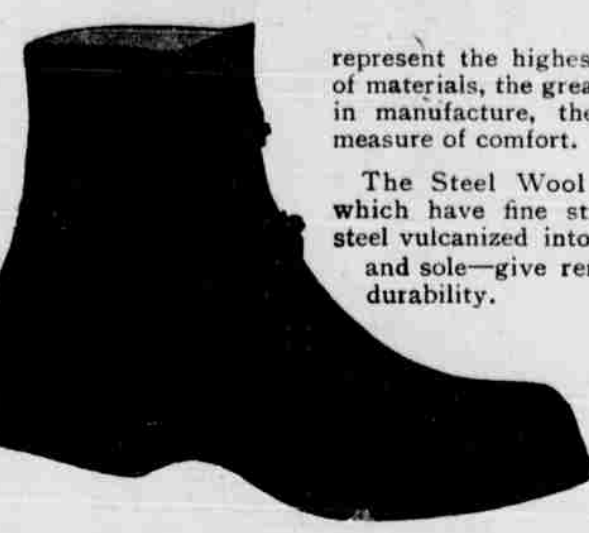
