EX-DICTATOR OF VENEZUELA LEAVES NEW YORK FOR HAVANA, CUBA.

WILL MEET ZELAYA, IS RUMOR

Ex-President Strenuously Denies This, Declaring He Did Not Know Nicaraguan-Insists That He is Only Taking Pleasure Trip.

New York, Feb. 25 .- Cipriano Castro, one time president of Venezuela. without warning, sailed for Havana

While he was being held a prisoner on Ellis island Castro denied that he had any intention of going to Havana. Immediately after his arrival it had been stated that Zelaya, his brother revolutionist of Nicaragua, was in Havana and was organizing a new revolution for that country.

Castro was asked if it was true he was going to meet Zelaya in the Cuban capital. "I do not know Zelaya," was the equivocal reply. "I have never met

Henri Le Claire Stabs His Comrade. Len Lemieux, to Death and Devours Part of Remains.

Winnipeg, Man., Feb. 26.-Tortured by furies of Alaskan winter, subsisting 30 days on skins of dead animals. and finally driven insane by eight-day period of starvation, Henri Le Claire. French trapper, killed and partially ate the body of Len Lemieux, a guide of the Hudson Bay company, near Mile 53, British Columbia, Monday. Le Claire and Lemieux had tasted no morsel of any kind for eight days on an extended hunt on which they started in December. In a deserted shack 75 miles from any settlement, both men awaited the other to sleep, for the killing of one meant food for the other. Part of the body was ate while Le Claire scratched the story on the cabin wall with his knife.

Report to Washington the Slaughter of Myriad of Allies in Scutari Battle-Capture Airman.

Washington, Feb. 25 .- Six thousand Montenegrins and 4,000 Servians perlahed at Scutari in the last battle between the allied troops and the Turkish forces, according to an official dispatch from Constantinople, received at the Turkish embassy Sunday. The town of Bardan was retaken by the Turks. The Ottoman war office advises that the Montenegrins do not seem to be in a position to continue the war.

NEBRASKA IS LUCKY

PUBLIC BUILDINGS BILL AMEND ED BY SENATE.

Public Buildings Bill Carries \$65,000 for Falls City, \$125,000 for Alliance and \$100,00 for Wahoo.

Washington.-Amendments to the public buildings bill increasing the sums allotted to Nebraska by \$265,000 were accepted by the senate committee on public buildings. They include \$65,000 for Falls City, \$125,000 for Almonth, the chief justice being pres- liance and a total of \$100,000 for We-The arrangements were offered by Senator Brown, the one providing for a building at Falls City being offered by him for Senator Hitchcock. Subsequently W. D. Eakin, secretary to Senator Hitchcock, appeared before the committee to explain the

need of the building at Falls City. Senator Swanson, a member of the committee, had also previously been informed that this amendment would be offered. Of these amendments the one affecting Falls City is expected to be accepted, despite the large shaving that the bill is certain to have when it reaches conference. There is talk of a filibuster against the measure. The meaning of this move is that the amendments tacked on in the senate must be cut out to a large extent in conference. The bill will be reported to the senate later.

Insurance Companies Must Invest. Lincoln.-With only two negative votes, the house insurance committee sent to the general file the Drucse dow-Brain bill, requiring life insurance companies to invest 70 per cent of the reserve on Nebraska policies in Nebraska securities. The committee voted after two previous sessions at which twenty-five insurance representatives, of both home and foreign companies, protested against the bill. It was declared unsatisfactory in Texas, the only state where it is in force, and it is said it would raise insurance rates.
