Sioux City Journal, 20: James Hoffman, alias John Hoffman, alias John Cook, who has slipped through the fingers of officers in several counties, has been traced by Sheriff E G Dilley to Glenwood, Ia, where he is in jail on a charge of breaking into a schoolhouse—a favorite escapade of Hoffman, according to Sheriff Dilley. It is likely that Hoffman will be turned over to Woodbury county authorities to face trial here on a charge of horse stealing. He is wanted for stealing a

horse belonging to Bert Burns, at Hornick, Ia. Hoffman and the horse were taken to Nebraska, and it was found to have traded the animal for a pony and \$35. Burns recovered the stolen horse and Hoffman was arrested at Homer. Sheriff Dilley took charge of Hoffman at Homer and started for Sioux City. At Dakota City, however, the prisoner balked, standing on his rights to demand extradition. While formalities were being complied with in the effort to extradite Hoffman he escaped from the Dakota county jail Christmas morning. It has been learned that Hoffman was married December 10, 1913, at Omaha, to Mary Woodward. His wife is in jail with him at Glenwood. According to the Glenwood authorities, Hoffman stole a black horse and a wagon at Crescent, Ia, after the episode at Dakota City. Hoffman was sent to the Anamosa reformatory February 11, 1911, from Sioux City on the charge of stealing chickens.

The funeral services were held from the home of her daughter, Mrs H O Linsafelter, Monday afternoon, conducted by Rev H A Brown, and the remains were shipped to Superior, Neb, for interment.

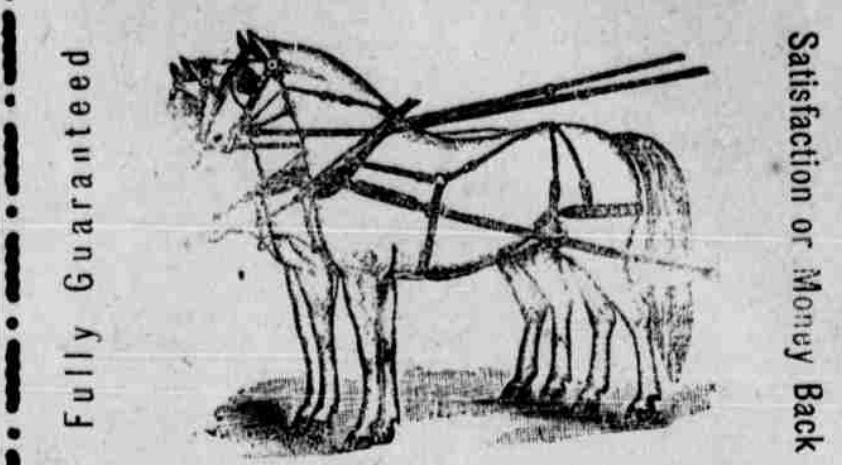
