The U S Civil Service Commission will hold a rural carrier examination October 10, 1914, at Dakota, Neb, to fill a vacancy at Sioux, Neb, and other vacancies as they may occur in rural routes in Dakota county. The pay of rural carriers is based on the length of the route and ranges from \$484 to \$1,200 per year. The route at Sioux, Neb, is 19 1/2 miles and pays \$880 per year. The age limit for examination is 18 to 55. An applicant must reside in the territory supplied by a post office in Dakota county. Application blanks can be secured from the postoffice at Dakota, Neb, and Sioux, Neb, or from the civil service commission at Washington, D C, and they should be properly executed and filed with the commission at least ten days prior to the date of the examination (Oct 10). As a result of the examination each successful applicant becomes eligible to appointment as rural carrier at any postoffice in the county.
