RUNTS IN FALL LITTERS. If the fall pigs are to come thru the winter without having a number of runts among them, now is the time to exercise care in feeding. Little pigs should grow, not fatten. Fattening a little pig checks his growth and renders him liable to thumps. On this account, do not feed too much corn. Give a ration that will provide bone and muscle building material. Such a ration can be made up of shorts 2 parts and corn 1 part, or skim milk 3 parts and corn 1 part. When the pigs get to weighing 75 pounds or more, this ration can be made to consist of 1/2 part shorts and 1/2 part corn. Almost any one of the small grains can be substituted for corn in the ration given. When small grains are used, they should be ground or crushed. Let the pigs have free access to good alfalfa hay. There is nothing that will take the place of alfalfa for growing pigs.—Nebraska College of Agriculture.

Sioux City Journal 13: Funeral services for Mrs Clara J Curry, who died in South Sioux City, were held at Westcott's chapel yesterday morning at 11:30 o'clock. Protection against future fires was sought yesterday in the organization of the South Sioux City volunteer fire department, whose object is to increase the efficiency of the village's fire fighting system. Lewis Hill was elected chief of the organization and thirty-five firemen were chosen from the three wards.

Mr Hall stated that the organization would go ahead with the plans by purchasing new apparatus from time to time as funds permitted and drilling the volunteers in the handling of the apparatus. One central station where the fire fighting implements will be housed and possibly a substation at the other end of the village for auxiliary purposes probably will be built. The organization expects to obtain funds from the village council to purchase the needed apparatus.

Twelve firemen have been chosen from each of the three wards to form the three companies of the brigade. A meeting of the volunteers will be held in a few days to work out a plan of fire fighting.

The destruction last week of the home of James Woodcock on the edge of the village because of lack of an efficient fire fighting organization and previous fires that have wrought great damage in the town led to the organization of the new department.

Luther Harden, Pioneer, Called by Death.

As a result of a paralytic stroke which befel him Saturday night, Luther Harden, one of the oldest residents of this place, passed peacefully away at the home of his daughter, Mrs Eva Orr, Tuesday night at about 12 o'clock, having never regained consciousness after he was stricken.

Mr Harden was born in Indianapolis, Ind, December 27, 1834, and would have been 80 years old had he lived until the 27th of this month. He came with his parents to Iowa in 1837. He was married to Miss Sarah Jane Underwood, March 6, 1857, in Jefferson county, Ia. May 9, 1867, he landed in Dakota county, Nebr., and made this his home continually until his death. He operated a butcher shop in Dakota City for many years, and was associated with D T Hodges, of Sioux City, in supplying the upper Missouri river Indian agencies with beef. In the summer months the cattle were driven to the agencies and delivered, and in the winter months the beef was delivered dressed.

He located on a farm north of town after quitting the butcher business, where he remained until he sold the farm about twenty years ago, when he retired from active farm life, and later moved town, with his wife, made his home with his only daughter, Mrs Eva L Orr.

Mr Harden is survived by two children, Mrs Eva L Orr and Burgen G Harden. Two children died in infancy, and his good wife passed to her reward a few years ago. The only other near relative is a sister, Mrs Margaret Johnson, of Independence, Kas.

Deceased was a devout and faithful member of the M E church in this place, having united with it many years ago.

Although an unassuming man, of quiet demeanor, his life was a busy one and many of the important enterprises of early days found him at the front.

The funeral services will be held today, Thursday, at 2 o'clock from the Methodist church in this place. Rev F J Aucock officiating. Burial will be made at Graefland Park cemetery, Sioux City, the service at the grave being held in the chapel at the cemetery.
