Called by Death. As a result of a paralytic stroke hich befel him Saturday night, Luher Harden, one of the oldest resieuts of this place, passed peacefully way at the home of his daughter, Mis Eva Orr, Tuesday pight at about 12 o'clock, having never regained con-

sciousness after he was stricken. Mr Harden was born in Indianapois, Ind, December 27, 1834, and would have been 80 years old had he lived until the 27th of this month. came with his parents to Iowa in 1837. STUDENTS EAT LESS MEAT AND PIE Meat and pie are becoming less popular in the diet of the students at the Nebraska University Farm, according to observations of the management at Home Economics Hall. It has been the practice for several years to serve meals to the students practically at cost. Last June it was decided to establish a cafeteria and do away with the accustomed method of serving meals. Since the students have had the opportunity to choose their own foods, the consumption of meat has fallen off over 20 per cent and vegetables have come into more common use. A similar decrease has been noted in the eating of pie. Fruits and light puddings have taken its place as a

stream and thus endanger a whole section of the state. Again, dogs, cats, or birds, attracted to the spot, may carry the germs to a hog lot far dis-tant and perhaps spread the disease for many miles. The department of animal pathology at the Nebraska University Farm urges that every hog dying of cholera or of any other contagious disease should be immediately burned in compliance with the state

KEEP STORAGE BATTERIES CHARGED

In case an automobile is used to such an extent that it would be impracticable to remove the storage battery during zero temperatures, it will be sufficiently cared for if kept fully charged. It has been found that when a storage battery is completely discharged it will freeze at 20 degrees above zero; when three fourths discharged it will freeze at zero; when half discharged it will freeze at 20 below zero; and when a fourth discharg-

ed at 60 below zero. This shows, therefore, that there will be no danger of leaving the battery in the car even during severely cold weather providing it is kept comparatively well charged. The amount of the charge can best be detected by testing the specific gravity of the cell. In the absence of any hydronometer at home, it can be tested at any ga-

It must be remembered that the storage battery will gradually become discharged when standing idle. For this reason, when the car is not being used for some time, the motor should be run occassionally, thus allowing the generator to charge the battery. The battery should be charged in this way at least once in two weeks .-- Nobrasks College of Agriculture.

Many important questions were act-ed upon by the Mebraska Farmers' Congress, in session in Omaha last week, and resolutions adopted expressing the views of the congress on these matters. More than five hundred delegates from all parts of the state were in attendance, these delegates representing farmers' organizations with a combined membership of seventy-four

thousand and ten. A resolution denouncing public warehouses was adopted, then rescinded, and one favoring the establishment of a public warehouse and public grain inspection substituted. The congress declared for a better rural school system and to continue the rural school commission, and recommended the reappointment of Dr L C Kigin as dep-
