For heifers from one to two years old the bulletin recommends the following rations:

Ration I.—About 3 pounds of corn daily; all the alfalfa hay the heifer will eat. Ration II.—Corn silage, 12 to 20 pounds; about 3 pounds daily of a grain mixture of equal parts corn chop, bran, and linseed meal or cottonseed meal; all the alfalfa hay the heifer will eat.
