An Ordinance to Prevent the Obstruction of Streets, Sidewalks, and Water Courses and to Prevent the Accumulatian of Manure, Filth and All Offensive Subs ances, and to Cause the Removal of the Same.

Be it Ordained by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Dakota Board of Trustees of the Village of Dakota City, Nebraska.

1. No person shall leave in any street or alley, nor on any sidewalk in said village, any lumber, wood, wagon or other vehicle, implements, barrels, boxes, merchandise, ashes, manure or anything whatever, in such a manuer as to obstruct in any degree the public use of such street, alley or side-walk.

walk.

2. No person shall fill or obstruct any gutter or other water course in said village or interfere in any manner with the public s. No person shall leave within said vil-lage the carcass of any animal, or any un-sound meat, fish, vegetables or other sub-stance, nor permit their premises, from any

cause, to become offensive from bad odors or stench, nor deposit any offal or other fifthy or offensive substance in or on any street, sidewalk, alley, lot or public ground street, sidewalk, alley, lot or public ground in said village nor allow the same to run into any/water course or tipon any street, sidewalk, alley, lot or public ground.

4. Any person who owns or occupies premises where any manure, rotten hay, stratfor other offensive substance has accumulated during the winter, shall remove and deposit the same outside the the limits of said village, provided the same may be deposited at some suitable piace within the village upon direction and approval of the street commissioner.

5. When any person who owns or occupies any premises where any manure, rot-

5. When any person who owns or occuples any premises where any manure, rotten hay, straw or other offensive substance has accumulated shall for forty-eight (48) hours after notice being given by the street commissioner of said village, neglect or refuse to remove the same, it shall be the duty of the street commissioner of said village to remove said manure, rotten hay, straw or other offensive substance and the cost of removing said nanure or other offensive substance shall be collected from the owner or the occupant of said premises of the abutting premises by suit, or by assessing the cost of the removal of said manure, at the or other offensive substance agains, said lot or abutting property, and shall be collected in the same manner as provided by law for the collection of other real estate taxes, or in any other manner as the board of trustees shall deem expedient.

6. Any person who shall be convicted of

6. Any person who shall be convicted of violating any provision of this ordinance shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars and all costs more than twenty-live to a construction.

7. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.
