I have carried on a few tests to note the effectiveness of corrosive sublimite in controlling this disease. On all of these demonstration fields check plots were maintained.

Let me especially call your attention to potato demonstration fields on the farms of John Sohn, Fred Schult, Herman Ebel and T. F. Mc-Glashen, where the effects now are plainly discernible and where the beneficial effect of the corrosive sublimate shows up in marked contrast against where not used.

The common preventative measure is to use bordeaux and spray the vines when they are young. But for the most effective way is to plant seed that is clean and free from blight.

My purpose in calling this to your attention is that you may be on guard. At harvest time I will hold some demonstrations and again before planting in the spring. Plan to attend these

The use of formalin and corrosive sublimate will help to eliminate scab to a marked degree also. Those of you who have used formalin in the treatment of oats for smut, should take an hour off and go over the area treated and note the difference in amount of smut present.
