The board of county commissioners of Dakota county, Nebraska, met pursuant to adjournment. Members present: Thomas Long, chairman; A. Ira Davis and G. W. Fisher; Sidney T. Fram, county attorney, and Geo. Wilkins, county clerk.

Board approves report of S. W. McKinley, county judge. Report shows collections for second quarter, \$15.65.
Board order for widows' pension to Louise Lattin, at the rate of \$5.00 per month, for period of six months, from October 22nd, 1916, and orders clerk to write warrant the first day of each month for same.
Board allows Cora Gumbally and family \$25.00 per month as widows' pension for the period of six months.
Board disallows the petitions asking that the question of abolishing the office of county assessor of Dakota county, Nebraska, be submitted to the voters at the general election, on November 7th, 1916, there being insufficient signatures of electors on said petitions.
Road petitioned for by F. L. Randall and others was held over until the next session of county board.
Now, at this time, the matter of selecting sixty names of the persons, legally qualified to serve as petit jurors, for the regular October 2nd, 1916, term of the district court of Dakota county, Nebraska, was taken up, and it appearing from the poll books, at the last general election, that a total of (1,574) votes were cast in the several precincts in Dakota county, Nebraska, divided as follows: Omadi, 307; Dakota, 217; St. Johns, 145; Summit, 114; Hagen Creek, 79; Hubbard, 192; Emerson, 150; and Covington, 370.
Whereupon the board selected from the poll books the names of sixty persons, one out of every 26 persons having the qualifications of a juror, and being divided among the several precincts in Dakota county, Nebraska, as follows: From Dakota, 8; Covington, 14; St. Johns, 6; Summit, 4; Pigeon Creek, 3; Hubbard, 7; Omadi, 12, and from Emerson, 6, which list of names is as follows:
