### Farm Notes.

#### FARMER MUST PAY INCOME TAX

Every unmarried person with an income of over \$1,000 a year and every married person with an income of over \$2,000 must pay an income tax. This of course applies to the farmer as well as to the business man. Failure to report to the collector of internal revenue in your district before March 1, 1918, is a violation of the law.

Naturally many farmers, who have never kept books, will have to do some pretty close figuring to explain just where they stand. Everything must be accounted for. Living expenses and interest received from investments cannot be deducted from the total. Neither can a farmer allow a salary to himself and expect that to be deducted. Taxes, cost of repairs, but not improvements, and actual expenses connected with the farm may be deducted, but that does not include personal expenses.

The department of farm management of the University of Nebraska has in press a large number of account books which will be distributed to the farmers of the state free of charge. They will not only give the farmer an insight into his own business, but will also enable him to make his income report without difficulty. #### HOME ECONOMICS MEETING

The meetings of the Nebraska Home Economics Association will be held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of Organized Agriculture Week, January 14 to 19. The program for the Women's Meeting has been very carefully prepared and is one that will interest every woman in Nebraska. In keeping with the times there is a patriotic touch to each day's program and many of the speakers will give helpful suggestions for women's service in war time.

All of Wednesday has been set aside as "Conservation Day." Lectures will be given showing various means of conservation and special attention will be given, in demonstrations, to conservation of food. It is hoped that "Conservation Day" may be converted into a "Round Table Day," and that those in attendance at the meeting will have many helpful suggestions to offer.

**HATCHING EGGS EARLY**  
If it has been the practice to start incubating eggs in April and May, thus getting out the chicks between the last week in April and the last week in May, one will have trouble in getting the pullets to lay before January or February of the next year, especially in the case of the general-purpose breeds, according to poultry experts of the Agricultural Extension Service. Since the greatest profits are made from pullets that lay during the late fall and winter, it is very important to start incubating the eggs so that the chicks will be hatched between the middle of March and the middle of April. All pullets hatched at that time and properly raised should be laying by the first of November when fresh eggs are high.

Following this plan will increase the profits per hen at least \$1 per year. Hatching eggs early each year becomes an easier task—especially if one lets the hens hatch the early eggs, since the pullets will become broody earlier in the spring.

#### FARM EQUIPMENT ASSOCIATION

A new society to meet during Organized Agriculture Week is a Farm Equipment Association, which will hold its first annual meeting on Saturday, January 19. The program will be just one day long and with a patriotic dinner in the evening. "Farm Lighting Systems" and "Tractors" will be the subjects of discussion. Short talks will be given by experts and the users of equipment will then have an opportunity to tell their experience.

#### EMERGENCY BULLETIN

Emergency Bulletin No. 25, "The Conservation of Sugar," is available for general distribution. It contains information on the sugar situation, the place of sugar in the diet, and some recipes utilizing sugar substitutes, such as honey, fruits, molasses and syrup. #### ARGENTINA A STRONG ALLY.

Regarded Far More Valuable Than Spain to United States and Other Nations Fighting Germany.

When the congress of Argentina voted to sever relations with Germany the people of the most powerful neutral left in the ranks of the pacifists showed their determination to join the allies. Argentina could work more good to the allies than could Spain. Her war potentiality is greater, for while her army is only 24,000 strong, compared to the 140,000 which Spain maintains, according to a publicist, her wealth far surpasses that of the older nation. Argentina is young, strong,

clean-limbed. Spain is old, fuddled and doddering.

The South American republic was the last dangerous nation whose people turned against the Kaiser. Its entrance into antagonism to Teutonism would mark the final and crowning blunder of German diplomacy.

None of the passive nations could give the allies so much in the way of vital help as could Argentina. After the United States, her sympathy and determined support are more to be valued by the democratic powers than any other unembroidered nation. Now she is girding her loins to follow her great Northern sister into the good work.

Argentina's population is only 8,000,000, in comparison to the 20,000,000 of Spain, but her manhood is developing while Spain's is anything but aggressive. Her character is made of cosmopolitan forces, the best and hardest of the adventurous races.

#### BATTLE FIELD DEATH TEST

Minimum Quantity of 33 Per Cent Solution of Dionin Recommended to Academy of Medicine.

Uncertainty as to whether a person be alive or dead is especially great on the battlefield, and prompt decision in such cases is far more important than in civil life, writes a correspondent at the front. Dr. A. Terson has just recommended to the French Academy of Medicine a new test, those already known having proved insufficient. The best of these latter has been the injection of fluorescein, as devised by Icard. But even this is uncertain, for in some cases men who are still alive do not show the green coloration of the whites of their eyes following injection, which the test is supposed to produce.

Dr. Terson recommends placing in the eye a minute quantity of a 33 per cent solution of dionin (ethyl-morphine), glycerine. If death has already taken place, nothing happens, but if the man has the slightest trace of life still in him the white of his eyes will immediately turn purplish-red and swell, but this inflammation will disappear rapidly and leave no ill effect.
