Feeding Lambs in the Fall

The Animal Husbandry department of the University of Nebraska will issue a bulletin soon on further experiments in fall lamb feeding. Clipping of lambs for fall feeding was found unprofitable on account of the discrimination against such lamb on the market. Lambs receiving a full feed of corn were found to be more profitable than those receiving but a half feed, on a corn and alfalfa ration. The use of the self-feeder containing corn and oil meal in comparison with the heavy feed of corn supplemented with alfalfa has also proved economical. Rape did not prove to be a satisfactory ration for fattening lambs. Blue grass produced the most economical gains of any ration used. The cornfield feeding of lambs gave a large daily gain, reduced the cost of gain in comparison with the dry lot feeding of corn and alfalfa, and increased the profit. These lambs carried the most flesh at any lot in the experiment and sold at the highest value per 100 pounds. Three lots of lambs fed green feed showed relatively high daily gains, and at the same time, with the exception of the rape fed lambs, a very cheap gain and as a result a relatively high net profit per head. The alfalfa and cornfield lots showed the two highest profits of any lots.
