The regular meeting of the Dakota County Farm Bureau was held at the County Agent's office, January 31, 1919.

Meeting called to order by President Beerman. Those present were: President Beerman, Vice President Mrs. J. T. Graham, Directors, Hartnett, Boals, Feller and Armour, Assistant Secretary, Mrs. Don Forbes, C. A. Reed of the Extension Department, Lincoln, Neb., and Secretary Forbes.

The matter of making a soil survey of the county was discussed by the board. It was moved by Hartnett and seconded by Feller, that the secretary be instructed to correspond with Prof. Geo. E. Condra, of Lincoln, to have the work done as soon as possible.

The matter of hiring a lady demonstration agent was discussed by the board. It was moved by Mrs. J. T. Graham that the offer of Mrs. Emma R. Davison, of the Extension Department to provide for the salary of the demonstration agent, if the Farm Bureau furnish the car, be accepted. Motion seconded by Hartnett, and carried.
