**Goat Good Milk Producer.**

Mr. Winthrop Howland of Redlands, Cal., last year had a Swiss Toggenburg goat, kept on the University of California farm, which broke the world's record as a milk producer, by over 300 pounds. For the period of one year this doe produced 2,941 pounds of rich sweet milk, or more than 24 times her own weight. The period of lactation for a good doe should be from seven to eight months.

**BEGINS HOLY WEEK**

**For Many Centuries Palm Sunday Has Been Day of Peculiar Significance.**

**P**ALM SUNDAY is the name usually given to the sixth and last Sunday in Lent and the beginning of holy week, after the custom of blessing branches of the palm tree or of other trees substituted in those countries in which the palm cannot be procured, and of carrying the blessed branches in procession. In commemoration of Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Palms and branches of the palm were used in this historic entry because the palm was then regarded as an emblem of victory and the carrying and waving of its branches was emblematic of success and in honor of royalty.

The date of the first observance of Palm Sunday is uncertain. In the Greek church it was apparently observed as early as the fourth century. In the middle ages the palm, worn as a decoration, denoted that the person so adorned had made the pilgrimage to the Holy Land.

In some countries people made use of figures of Christ seated on an ass, carved out of wood, which were carried in religious processions and even brought into the church. In other countries it was the custom to strew flowers and green boughs in church yards.

The palms used in the procession of the day are taken home by the faithful and used as a sacramental. They are preserved in prominent places in the houses, barns or even in the fields, and thrown into the fire during storms. From the blessed palms are procured the ashes for use on Ash Wednesday.

Where palms cannot be secured branches of olive, box elder, spruce or other trees are used. In Rome olive branches are distributed to the people, while the clergy carry palms frequently dried and twisted into various shapes. In parts of Bavaria large swamp willows, with their catkins, and ornamented with flowers and ribbons, were used.

Because every great feast at this time was in some way a remembrance of the resurrection of Christ and was in consequence called Pascha, the Spanish term pascua florida had its origin. Thus it was that in 1512 the state of Florida, which was settled by the Spaniards, indirectly received its name.

**HARD TO CALL THESE EGGS**

**Record Freaks Devised for Those Who Were Careless About the Expenditure.**

The use of artificial eggs made of sugar, chocolate, glass, etc., is of modern origin. In all large cities of Christendom the confectioners' stores rival one another in their efforts to turn out the daintiest and most attractive Easter eggs. Sometimes they are of mammoth size and great cost. A few years ago an English lord had manufactured by a famous confectioner a gigantic egg that was intended for his lady love, the daughter of a millionaire in South Africa. This Easter gift was not less than three yards high and one and one-half yards in diameter, so that a person sitting on a chair could easily have space in the inside. The monster was filled with no less than 1,000 pounds of candy. An egg intended for the Infanta of Spain was manufactured at Paris at a cost of 20,000 francs (\$4,500). This costly Easter egg was made of white enamel, had in the inside engraved the passages of the Bible referring to Easter, and by means of a complicated mechanical contrivance a bird was made to fly out of it and sing twelve airs from well-known operas.

**Out of Khaki.**

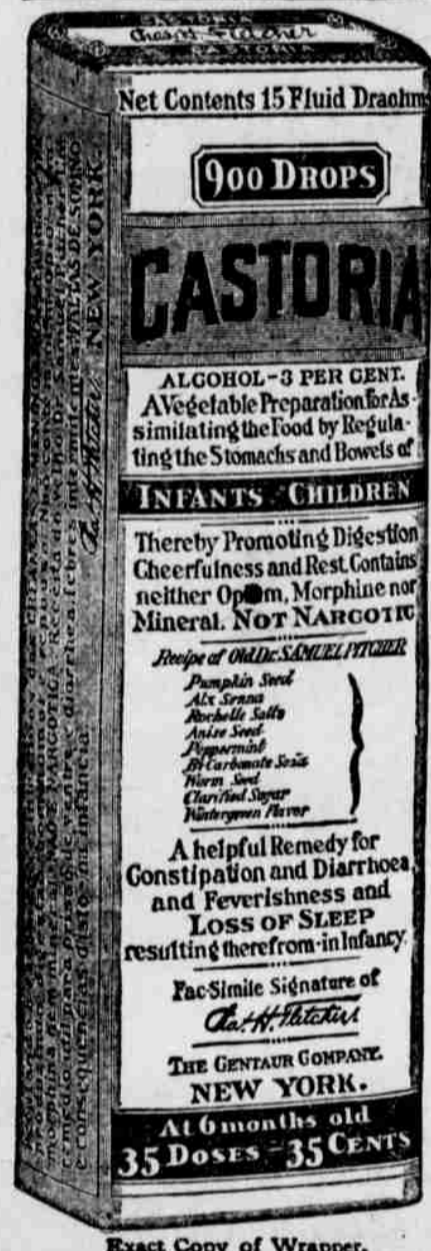
The man who had lived and moved and had his being in khaki for the duration had at last been demobilized. He had also become demoralized.

**Will Help Restore Forests.**

The American Forestry association will aid in restoring the forests of Great Britain, France and Belgium which were sacrificed to the allied cause in the war.
