An ordinance declaring the west one-half of the southwest quarter and lots three and four in section twenty-eight, township twenty-nine, range nine, east sixth P. M. annexed to the City of South Sioux City, Dakota county, Nebraska, and extending the corporate limits of the said city to include said premises. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of South Sioux City, Dakota County, Nebraska. Section 1. The west one-half of the southwest quarter and lots three and four in section twenty-eight, township twenty-nine, range nine, East sixth P. M., are hereby annexed to the City of South Sioux City, Dakota County, Nebraska, as provided by a decree of the District Court of Dakota County, Nebraska, on the 12th day of November, 1918, and the corporate limits of the said City are hereby extended so as to include the said premises and the said premises are hereby made a part of the city and hereby included in its corporate limits and to be treated in all respects hereafter as a part of the said city. Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be enforced from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law. Passed and approved this 6th day of May, 1919. J. L.
