ORDINANCE NO. 245.
AN ORDINANCE prohibiting the discharge of firearms within the limits of the Village of Dakota City, and providing a penalty for the violation thereof.

Be it ordained by the Chairman, Board of Trustees of the Village of Dakota City, Nebraska:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to shoot or discharge any gun, revolver, pistol, or firearm of any description, within the corporate limits of this village, and every person so committing such offense shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than \$1.00 and no more than \$10.00.

Section 2. Section 1 of this ordinance shall not be so construed as to prevent the Village Marshal from discharging firearms in the discharge of the duties of his office.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication, as required by law.

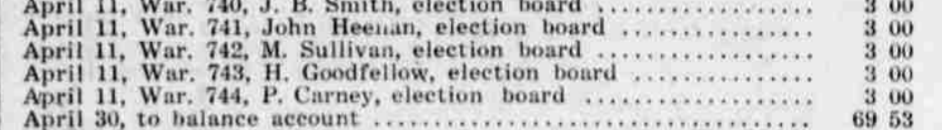
