#### THE POTATO MARKET SEASON

(From Farm Bureau News). This year's potato crop has been reduced greatly, compared with early estimates. Early potatoes were lightly planted and the yield was cut down by excessive rains in the south-

Late potatoes were planted in larger acreages than in any season during the past seven years except 1917 and 1918, but dry weather cut down the yield and size of the western potato crop, while the eastern crop was somewhat reduced by blight, rot and insects. The net result is an estimated yield of 284,605,000 bushels according to the September report of the Bureau of Crop Estimates, compared with 340,699,000 bushels the year before, and 229,415,000 bushels in the short crop year of 1916.
