### Village Board Proceedings

Dakota City, Neb., April 24, 1919. Board met at special session with all members present. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. On motion the following bills were allowed and warrants ordered drawn on the proper village funds for the same:

On motion the sum of \$100.00 was ordered transferred from the general fund to the cemetery fund, and the sum of \$200.00 from the general fund to the road fund out of moneys not otherwise appropriated. It was then moved, seconded, and carried that the clerk and treasurer pay off and retire so many of the light and water bonds of the village as the condition of the respective funds will warrant.

The returns of the general village election being presented, the same were duly canvassed, whereupon it was found that there were 21 votes cast at said election and that G. F. Broyhill received 18 votes for trustee; that Harry H. Adair received 18 votes for trustee, and that William Biermann received 16 votes for trustee.

It was therefore moved, seconded and carried that as G. F. Broyhill, Harry H. Adair and William Biermann had received the highest number of votes at said election that they be declared duly elected. The following oath was then taken and subscribed by said officers:

"State of Nebraska, Dakota County, ss. We, G. F. Broyhill, Harry H. Adair and William Biermann, do solemnly swear that we will support the constitution of the United States of America and of the State of Nebraska, and that we will faithfully and impartially perform the duties of Trustees of the Village of Dakota City, Nebraska, to the best of our ability."

"Subscribed in my presence and sworn to before me this 24th day of April, 1919. Sidney T. Frum, Notary Public."

The board then proceeded to organize for the ensuing year. On motion the following officers were appointed: Chairman, G. F. Broyhill; clerk and attorney, Sidney J. Frum; treasurer, Elmer H. Biermann; marshal and street commissioner, William Lahrs; salaries of each of the officers to be the same as the preceding year.

On motion the board adjourned.

Report of H. H. Adair as village treasurer being on file, the same checked over, accepted and approved, on motion of the board and ordered published in the Dakota County Herald.

**ORDINANCE NO. 245,** an Ordinance prohibiting the discharge of any firearms in the village of Dakota City, was on motion placed on its first reading and was thereafter regularly read.

It was moved by Buchanan, seconded by Biermann, all members present voting "Aye," that Ordinance No. 245 pass its first reading.

It was then moved by Buchanan, seconded by Biermann, all members present voting "Aye," that the rule regarding the passage of ordinances be suspended and that Ordinance No. 245 be placed on its second reading. Ordinance No. 245 was then fully read.

It was moved by Buchanan, seconded by Biermann, that Ordinance No. 245 pass its second reading, all members present voting "Aye."

It was then moved by Buchanan, seconded by Orr, that the rule regarding the passage of ordinances be again suspended and that Ordinance No. 245 be placed on its third and final reading. All members present voting "Aye."

Ordinance No. 245 was then regularly and fully read for the third time.

It was then moved by Buchanan and seconded by Orr that Ordinance No. 245 pass its third and final reading and become a legal and valid ordinance of said village from and after its publication as required by law.

Clerk was then instructed to publish Ordinance No. 245 in the Dakota County Herald.

On motion the board adjourned to meet at next regular meeting.
