Feeders Endorse Regulation of Packers

Two hundred members of the Nebraska Livestock Feeders' association, meeting at the University Farm, Lincoln, passed resolutions endorsing proposed national legislation for the regulation of the packing industry. The association also voted to name committees of feeders to cooperate with the College of Agriculture in determining the cost of meat production and to investigate ways and means of stabilizing markets. The recent drop in fat stock prices has cost Nebraska feeders thousands of dollars. The meat producers are looking forward to the time when they can receive the cost of production plus a reasonable profit for their finished product, the same as any other industry.
