Valuable Information For Irrigation Farmers

" Practical Information for Beginners in Irrigation," and "Irrigation of Alfalfa" are two United States department of agriculture farmers' bulletins containing much vaulable information for those who are contemplating farming by irrigation. The first one contains suggestions aimed to assist those who would master the details of preparing land for irrigation, laying out and building farm ditches, and handling the water supply so as to asure the best re-sults. The other bulletin deals with the methods of irrigating alfalfa, amount of water required, proper time to irrigate, winter irrigation, irrigation to prevent winter killing irrigation to prevent winter-killing, rise of ground water and its effects on alfalfa, subirrigation, etc. The numbers of the bulletins are 864 and 865 respectively. They may be obtained free from the College of Agriculture, Lincoln.
