Mrs. John W. Ryan Departs this Life

Mrs. John W. Ryan, before her marriage, Margaret Maloney, departed this life at her home near Jackson, Neb., Friday, April 16, 1920, from pernicious anaemia, with which she was stricken last December.
All her life had been spent in Dakota county, she being the daughter of Michael and Mary Maloney, pioneers, at their farm near Hubbard.
She was a fine woman, noble of character—a real wife and mother, devoting all of her time to her home and family, having no thought but for their care and welfare.
She is survived by her husband, John W. Ryan, her daughter, Margaret Ryan; by one brother, John Maloney, and two sisters, Mrs. T. M. Cullen and Mrs. W. W. Sheehan, all of Hubbard, and another brother, James Maloney, of Portland, Ore.
All their lives have been spent on their farms, excepting two years residence at Riverside Avenue, in Sioux City, returning to their farm last fall.
Mrs. Ryan was of real pioneer stock, beloved by all who knew her and noted for her kindness of heart, her warm, open friendship for all, her goodness and her charity. She was a home-builder—like most pioneer women with a friend in all she knew, and will be most sincerely mourned, not alone by her immediate relatives, but by hundreds of warm, personal friends.
Throughout her months of illness she was always patient, pleasant—seemingly content with whatever God visited upon her, with a great faith in His love and mercy.
The funeral was held from St. Patrick's church in Jackson, Monday morning, April 19th, at 9 a. m., with burial in St. John's cemetery there, and attended by a large concourse of loving friends and relatives.
Lives like hers are living lessons—milestones along humanity's pathway that teach all the better way to live. Lives like hers make one better appreciate the sterling character of true womanhood, untainted by society or the follies of the age.
Thus did she live and die—one of the noblest creations of God—a true, loyal and faithful wife and mother, always true to herself, her faith, her God and her duties to others.
