The Board of Equalization of Dakota County, Nebraska, met pursuant to adjournment with the following members present: J. P. Rockwell, county assessor; John Feller, O. W. Fisher and William H. Rockwell, commissioners; Geo. J. Boucher, deputy county clerk, and Geo. Leaner, county attorney.

Assessment returns for the several precincts examined and considered. Board adjourned to meet July 2, 1920.

Dakota City, Nebraska, July 2, 1920.

The Board of Equalization of Dakota County, Nebraska, met pursuant to adjournment with the following members present: J. P. Rockwell, county assessor; John Feller, William H. Rockwell and O. W. Fisher, commissioners; Geo. J. Boucher, deputy county clerk, and Geo. W. Leamer, county attorney.

The following order was made by the board and the county assessor directed to correct the assessors' books accordingly:

Whereas, after due consideration of the returns made by the several precinct assessors, it appears and is adjudged by the board, that certain adjustments on a percentage basis necessary to arrive at a just and equitable assessment as between the several precincts, it is hereby ordered: That the land valuations of Hubbard precinct as returned by the precinct assessor of said precinct and adjusted by this board, be raised forty per cent; that the land valuations of St. John's precinct as returned by the precinct assessor thereof, and adjusted by this board, be raised forty per cent; that the land valuations of Summit precinct as returned by the precinct assessor thereof, be raised twenty-five per cent; that the land valuations of Emerson precinct as returned by the precinct assessor thereof, be lowered fifteen per cent; that the valuations as returned for the City of South Sioux City, on improvements or lowered twenty per cent. All members voting "Aye."

No further business appearing, the board adjourned sine die.

VILLAGE BOARD PROCEEDINGS

Dakota City, Neb., July 2, 1920. Board met in Special Session for the purpose of passing the annual appropriation Ordinance, with all members present.

Ordinance No. 247, being an Ordinance providing for the appropriation of money to be raised by levying a tax on all taxable property within said village, said money to be used for the purpose of defraying the expenses of said village for the fiscal year commencing on the 1st Tuesday in April, 1920, and ending on the last Tuesday in April, 1921, was then placed on its first reading and fully and regularly read.

It was then moved by Biermann and seconded by Buchanan, all members voting "Aye," that Ordinance No. 247 pass its first reading.
