BIGGEST MAN IN THE WORLD AT THE INTERSTATE FAIR



Jan Van Albert is the biggest man in the world today—physically speaking. The giant Hollander, who is 9 feet, 5 inches tall, will be one of the big attractions at the Interstate Fair, Sept. 19th to 25th.

Jan Van Albert is 19 years old and comes from a family of seven. He is the only abnormal member. He was born in Amsterdam and arrived in this country only a few months ago.

Van Albert occupies two staterooms in a sleeping car, the partitions between the two rooms having been knocked out. When Jan came to this country, it was necessary to build a special berth in the passage way of the Mauretania, in order to provide him with sleeping quarters.

A whole family could be clothed from the material necessary to make him a suit. Nine yards of cloth are used in making each of his suits, and he carries a wardrobe of 16 suits. Jan's shoes make Charley Chaplin's "Dogs" look like Cinderella's slippers. He wears a number 14½ shoe and his hats cost \$70.
