


The books for the play to be given arrived Monday and work was begun at once. This play will be given shortly after Christmas, and a big success is anticipated.

Farmers Interested in 'Cost of Production.

Inquiries received by the Nebraska College of Agriculture indicate that a large number of farmers are planning to keep cost-of-production records next year. The generous crops and ruinous prices this year are setting farmers to figuring losses per acre and per bushel. Generally the farmer has taken the stand that he did not want to know about_ his This year he has executed a losses. right about face. There are indications that crop profits in the future may have something to do with land big profits. Officers of many farmers' organizations are writing the College for blanks on which to keep account of the cost of growing crops In addition to special blanks for crops. ness. The book is the official account book of the Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation and the College of Agri-culture and is recommended by the United States Treasury Department as particularly suited for making income tax returns. It may be obtained from farm bureaus and banks.
