



It is better to send an appropriate card with a happy greeting than to engage in a struggle to out-do a neighbor or a relative in the exchange of highpriced gifts. Children should be encouraged to make presents for their parents with their own hands. Likewise, parents' gifts to their children need not be expensive. A child has more fun with a rag doll than with any bisque doll that must be handled with care lest it be broken. The cir-cular may be had upon request.
