John F. Sides Dies of Heart Failure

The sudden death of John F. Sides, at his farm home three miles southwest of Dakota City, Monday evening, came as a shock to his family and friends. Mr. Sides had not been in the best of health for some time, but his condition was not considered serious. He had been attending to his farm work as usual until the evening of his death, when, after retiring for the night, he realized that something was wrong with him, and called his father-in-law, Mr. T. T. Lindsay, who immediately summoned a physician, but before assistance arrived he had passed away.

Mr. Sides came to Dakota county about thirty-five years ago, and took up his residence on the farm where he died. He followed school teaching for several years, teaching in his home district, the Hileman school, and in the Springfield district in Dixon county. He was elected sheriff of Dakota county in 1899, and served for two terms. He was appointed deputy United States marshal in 1903, and served in that capacity for twelve years. He was considered one of the best deputies in the state, and was sent on many important missions by his superiors.

During his long residence in Dakota county he had been one of its most influential and prosperous citizens, honest as the day is long, and always working for the best interests of the community.

He was united in marriage to Etta M. Lindsay on November 25, 1891. She, with two sons, Earl L., and Frank M., survive him. Three brothers and three sisters also survive him, one brother living at Lincoln, Neb., and the others in Pennsylvania.

Mr. Sides was a member of Omadi Lodge No. 5, A. F. & A. M., and Dakota Chapter No. 65, Order of Eastern Star, of Dakota City; Haggai Chapter Royal Arch Masons of Wakefield; Damascus Commandery of Norfolk, and Tangier Temple, Mystic Shrine of Omaha, and also a member of the M. B. A. and M. W. A. lodges of this place.

Funeral services will be held Friday forenoon at 11:30, from Westcott's chapel in Sioux City. Rev. D. W. McGregor, of University Place, a former M. E. pastor here, will conduct the services. The Masonic fraternity will conduct the services at the grave in Graceland Park cemetery.

The loss of a true and worthy citizen like John F. Sides comes as a shock to the community where he had been a prominent factor for so many years. His pleasant smile and cheerful greeting will be missed. To the bereaved family the heartfelt sympathy of the community is extended in their great loss of a loving husband and father.
