DOINGS IN THE DISTRICT COURT

Following are the recorded proceedings of District Judge Guy T. Graves at the recent term of court held in this place:

Thomas Bronson vs. Kate Bronson: Dismissed for want of prosecution at cost of plaintiff.
C. W. Hitt vs. C. St. P. M. & O. Ry. Co., C. B. & Q. Ry. Co.: Dismissed as per stipulation on file.
Fred Martin vs. Lillie Kuh: Dismissed as per stipulation on file.
Drainage District No. 2, Dakota County, Nebraska, vs. Henry W. O'Neill et al.: Defendants George J. Boucher, administrator, H. H. Adair and E. H. Gribble, administrator, granted two days in which to plead.
Webb Kellogg vs. Ruth Armstrong et al.: On motion of W. J. Hammond case stricken from docket.
Fannie Emma Emery vs. Jannie Semple Hill Co. et al.: No showing made case dismissed for want of prosecution at cost of plaintiff.
Patrick Montgomery vs. C. B. & Q. Railroad Co.: Settled and dismissed at cost of plaintiff.
Simey L. Ewing vs. Carl Sund: Motion for cost bond sustained; bond for costs ordered filed within 10 days or case will stand dismissed.
Arthur M. Leland vs. Walter D. Hines, as Director General of Railroads of the United States of America: Dismissed as per stipulation on file.
Etta H. Halstead vs. John F. Burkhead et al.: Ordered to show cause, if any, why sale should not be confirmed; no cause shown sale confirmed and deed ordered.
Charles S. Buckley et al. vs. City of South Sioux City: Demurrer sustained as to the corporation and partnership; plaintiffs overruled as to personal petition; leave granted to make John Green plaintiff; plaintiff given leave to file amended petition within 30 days.

Catherine Dougherty et al. vs. A. L. White: Motion sustained; plaintiff allowed 10 days to amend petition; defendant allowed until May 1, 1921, to answer.

ants defaulted; court finds allegations of petition to be true; amount due plaintiff to be the sum of \$307.80, interest at 8 per cent; decree of foreclosure and sale as prayed; stay ordered for nine months.

CULLING THIS FLOCK PAID

The value of culling poultry down to the good layers was demonstrated in the handling of a flock in Platte county. The agricultural agent last September reduced a flock from 200 to 63 hens, by the application of the rule for picking the best layers, as set forth in the Agricultural Experiment Station Circular 12, called "How to Select the Good Layers." Improved methods of feeding were then put in use and the results noted. At no time during the winter have fewer than nine eggs a day been received from the 63 hens, and this number has been as high as 40 eggs. Since September 10, the sale of hens, roosters and eggs has brought in a total of \$475. The owner of the flock is so fully convinced as to the merits of culling and proper feeding that he now proposes to go a step further and keep nothing but standardbred poultry. The circular "How to Select the Good Layers" may be obtained free from the College of Agriculture. More than 6,000 copies have been distributed among farmers of Nebraska.
