McClellan has been offered several large and important charges, both in the Friends church, and in two other denominations. He was offered the superintendency of a large district in one of these large denominations. He has finally decided to accept a call to the Friends church at Milo, Iowa. He has served his excellent church as pastor upon two different occasions, covering a period of several years, having built his church up from a very small church to a large and influential one. Since leaving this charge at the close of his second pastorate twelve years ago, he has had three calls from the same church to return as their pastor again. Early last May he received the fourth call from this church, signed by the entire church membership, as well as the business men of the town and all the people of the community. He returns to a section of country where he has served five different churches during the past sixteen years, so it will be like going "back home" to the McClellan family.
