COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES

W. E. VOSS, Superintendent

In these notes will be found some of the powers and duties of the county attendance officer, whose office was created by the new compulsory education law. However, we have no such officer in this county as yet, for no funds have been allowed to pay him. The law provides that the county superintendent of schools in each of the counties in the state shall appoint one or more attendance officers who shall be vested with police powers and who shall enforce the provisions of the compulsory education law.

In our county but one such officer would be necessary. According to the law, he is to be paid for his services in such sums as shall be determined by the county commissioners upon recommendation of the county superintendent.

The public is likely to think that the carrying out of this compulsory education law falls entirely upon the county attendance officer. This is not the case, for in all school districts in this state any superintendent, principal, teacher, or member of the school board who shall know of any violation of this law on the part of any child of school age, his parents or person in actual or legal charge or control of any such child or on the part of any other person shall report such violation to the county superintendent. The county superintendent shall immediately cause an investigation of the case to be made by the attendance officer. The officer will then acquaint himself with the case, and render all service in his power to compel such child to attend some public, private, denominational or parochial school which the person having control of the child shall designate. Then if such person still fails to send a child or children to school, he will serve a written notice on the person or persons violating this law, warning him to comply with its provisions. Further, if the person or persons persist in violating the attendance law for another week after receiving the written notice, then the officer shall file a complaint against them before the judge of the juvenile court, which in our county is the county judge. The law further provides that if a person violates the attendance law within any school year after he has received one written notice that he is not to be notified of his offenses thereafter, but that the county attendance officer shall file his complaint at once in the proper court.
