> Large Profit from Small Vineyard Mr. Lake Bridenthal of near Wy more, Neb., a breeder of Durocs and Percherons, is the owner of a three-quarter-acre vineyard of which he is justly proud and of which he recently gave an account to the horticulture specialists of the Agriculture College. Six years ago the plants were set out, 450 of them and mostly Concords. This year the grapes from the vines sold for \$360, representing 90 bushels at \$4.00 per bushel. The average yield per vine was eight pounds, which is high considering that the first fruiting shoots were frozen back last spring. The results show what the possibilities are when the vines are given good care and the proper type of pruning.

"Grapes are fairly easy to grow," said Mr. Bridenthal. "The area between the rows is disced two or three times during the early summer. 
