Good stories of their first experiences as club members were written in the reports. "Why I am Glad I became a Member of the Garment Making Club," by Harriet Pilgrim of the Wide Awake Club of South Sioux City:

"For the following reasons. First, it teaches me how to sew and we learn new stitches on each garment we make. The different garments make the work more interesting and we try to improve our sewing on each new article. Secondly we have social times and demonstrations which help to keep us interested. The demonstrations create rivalry, so each one works hard so that they might win a prize. We meet at different home every two weeks, and our leaders, Mrs. McBeath and Mrs. Royce, meet with us. They help us out on the garments, show us how to make the new stitches and also tell us in what way we might have improved our work. Then she watches closely to see if we carried out

the suggestions she made. We try to have our garments finished by the next meeting and then with the help of Mrs. McBeath and Mrs. Royce, we discuss our work. I did not win a prize at our contest but I feel that my time was not wasted, because I learned a lot about sewing and maybe what I have learned this summer will help me win a prize some other time. So if we have our club next summer I will be glad to join again.
