**FARMERS NEED FACTS**  
A net profit is a rare achievement these days. It is something that every farmer is striving for. How can it be secured? How may it be recognized when found? It can be secured only by the most skillful organization of the various enterprises of the farm business. The problem is made more difficult from the fact that balance in the farm business may be upset by shifting of railway rates, over-production, and changes in foreign demand. The production problem calls for carefully laid plans based on facts. The farmer needs facts on world conditions, he needs facts on the economic situation, and he needs the facts on his own farm business. A simple farm account book, such as the one prepared by the Nebraska Agricultural College, a pencil, and not to exceed five minutes per day will give a farmer the facts on his own business. It will tell him if his labor is distributed to best advantage. It is true that he knows the hard facts concerning cheap oats, cheap cattle, and thirty-cent corn, but does he know what it cost to produce the things he has for sale? The question is, can he afford to get along without the facts?

the breeders of pure-bred livestock, and to encourage the use of pure-bred livestock on every farm, giving emphasis to the use of pure-bred sires only.  
**Article III—Place of Business.**  
The principal place of business of this association shall be at Emerson, Nebraska.  
**Article IV—Membership.**  
Any reputable breeder who owns one or more pure-bred animals may become a member of this association upon the payment of a membership fee of \$5.00, which shall include his first annual dues, and an annual fee of \$5.00 per year during the time that he belongs to this association, which shall be due on each succeeding October 1st, after the year 1921.  
**Article V—Officers.**  
Sec. 1. The officers of this association shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary-Treasurer, and a Board of Directors, consisting of the President, Vice President and Secretary-Treasurer of the Association, and seven members, one to represent horse breeders, two to represent swine breeders, two to represent beef cattle breeders, one to represent dairy cattle breeders, and one to represent sheep breeders, unless there are no breeders from any class from which to select a director.  
Sec. 2. Each class of breeders entitled to representation will have power to select their own director or directors.  
**Article VI—Election of Officers.**  
The election of officers shall take place immediately following the adoption of this constitution. Subsequent elections shall be held annually on the first Tuesday in October, beginning with 1922, at which time the officers and board of directors of the association shall be chosen by ballot, to serve for one year. Notice of the annual meeting shall be given by the secretary of the association, at least eight days prior to the meeting.  
**Article VII—Duty of Officers.**  
The duty of the President, Vice President and Secretary-Treasurer shall be such as usually devolved to like officers in similar organizations. The Secretary-Treasurer, in addition to keeping all records, shall use his utmost endeavors to promote the welfare of the association; he shall, under the direction and assistance of the board of directors, compile the directories, arrange the advertising therein, and shall provide for the distribution of the same. He shall, upon inquiry, mail a distributing list showing available stock for market, which list shall be revised every three months or as often as conditions warrant.  
**Article VIII—Board of Directors.**  
Sec. 1. The board of directors shall have authority to audit the bills and general power to supervise and order the work of the Association. They shall meet semi-annually, one of which meetings shall be immediately following the annual meeting of the stock holders. The other semi-annual meeting will be held upon the call of the President. Such other meetings as may be deemed expedient may be called by the President. Notice of such meetings shall be mailed to each director by the Secretary at least eight days prior to date of meetings. No business shall be done in special meetings other than that stated in call.  
Sec. 2. The board of directors shall elect a competent committee to inspect each animal to be entered in any co-operative sale to be conducted under the direction of this Association, before such sale is advertised.  
Sec. 3. All co-operative sales advertised under the name of this Association shall be supervised by a sales manager appointed by the board of directors of this Association whose duty it shall be to direct the sale in such a way that it will be a credit to the organization and a profit to the consignors.  
**Article IX—Quorum.**  
A majority of the members of this association in good standing shall constitute a quorum to transact business; a majority of the members of the board of directors shall constitute a quorum to transact business in the directors' meetings.  
**Article X—Indebtedness.**  
No indebtedness shall be contracted or liabilities incurred by this Association in excess of the cash in the hands of the Treasurer of the Association.  
**Article XI—Amendments.**  
This constitution may be amended by three-fourths vote of those present at any regular meeting or any called meeting, provided the amendment proposed is stated in the call.  
**Article XII—By-Laws.**  
By-laws not in contravention to this constitution may be adopted at any regular or called meeting by a majority vote of those present.  
Sec. 1. The board of directors shall have the power to fill all vacancies until the next annual election.

**Constitution and By-Laws of the Northeast Nebraska Pure-Bred Livestock Breeders' Association.**  
**Article I—Name.**  
The name of this organization shall be the Northeast Nebraska Pure-Bred Livestock Breeders' Association.  
**Article II—Object.**  
The object of this organization shall be to promote the interests of
